Dear Parents and Carers
I hope you have had a good week.

Our Years 4 & 5 started the week with a lovely and well-rehearsed whole school assembly on Jeans for Genes. They were able to explain to the school how this day raises awareness and by donating money to the charity, it provides opportunities for children and families who are affected by genetic disorders. The school raised £260, which is a very pleasing total.

Hosted by Year 13's Jonny E, the whole school loved shouting out their answers and scoring points, with the House of **St Edmund and St Catherine of Alexandria** being crowned the overall winners! Well done to everyone involved.



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A colourful Languages Day!



This week the whole school community came together to celebrate our diversity of cultures and languages.

The students and staff came in colours of the flag of their chosen countries and wore wristbands or badges. It was great to see the diversity of cultures that enriches our community and hear about the background and experiences of students and staff in other parts of the world. Every form participated in a Quiz at form time.

The school lunch menu offered 'tortilla de patatas' and 'Tzatziki'; the year 7s in their catering lesson saw a video about how to make tortilla and Paella at home and many of the bilingual students expressed their sense of excitement to share their culture. In the Community Languages club, a student brought 'sweet rice' and we watched a Bollywood movie. Afro-beat music is scheduled for next Thursday for those who would like to participate, led by students.

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The Assembly of the Languages Day touched on the key changes in the demography of Europe from 1950s to 2023 where almost every country in Europe is enriched with a tapestry of languages and cultures. It showed how our NHS has been enriched with people of immigrant generations; doctors, nurses and support staff and key workers. It explained that language is a means to better communication and improving relationships; it also showed the rare language of 'El Silbo de Gomera' which is made entirely of whistling.



We were in for a treat when Year 5s demonstrated greetings in different cultures with diverse and different meanings, and finished with Jayden and Eden in Year 7 singing 'Allez les bleus Mbappe'. The students who accompanied the song and then the audience were in uproar when Jayden put on his break-dance performance.



The message of the song was about a diverse football team that challenges racism and gives the message 'on est ensemble' (we are together).

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Year 12 at Parliament: A Day of Democracy

On Friday 15th September, our Year 12 students embarked on an enrichment excursion to the heart of British democracy—the Houses of Parliament. This exciting trip demonstrated their commitment to democracy and an understanding of their responsibility as future voters.

The afternoon began as our Year 12 students entered the grand Westminster Palace, where history and politics intertwine. Their guided tours of the House of Commons and the House of Lords provided them with a first hand look at the inner workings of the UK's political system.

One of the trip's highlights was a workshop that delved into the inspiring history of the suffragettes. Our students learned about the courageous women who fought tirelessly for women's voting rights in the early 20th century.

The trip's most interactive component was an advocacy exercise. Year 12 students were asked to form groups, vote on a leader and asked to research and present an issue they felt strongly about. This hands-on experience encouraged teamwork, critical thinking, and effective communication.

After absorbing the persuasive arguments presented by their peers they collectively voted for the issue they believed had the best chance of success. This exercise not only fostered democratic principles but also reinforced the power of informed decision-making.



Throughout the day, our Year 12 students exemplified remarkable maturity and enthusiasm. Their respectful behaviour in this historic setting was a testament to their character and a source of pride for our school community. The Year 12 trip to Parliament was an experience that combined history, democracy, and advocacy into a single enriching afternoon.

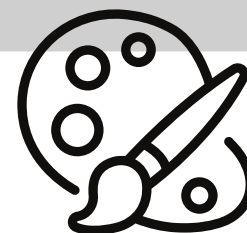

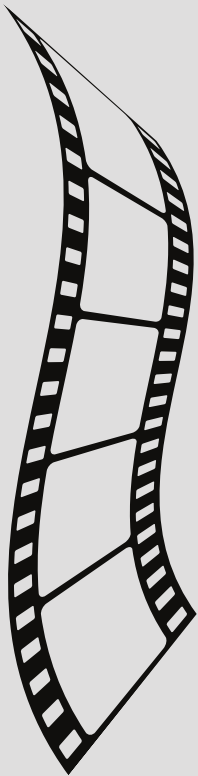
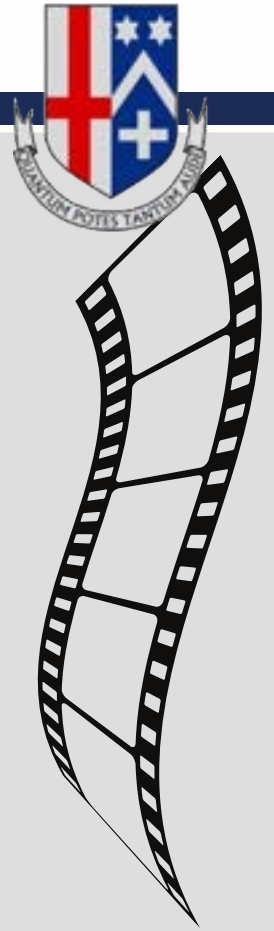

Message from your Safer Schools Officers: Talk to your child about phone safety

Mobile phones are a great way to stay in contact with family and friends. Most Secondary School aged children now own one or have access to one.

As useful as they are, they can make children vulnerable to thieves who are particularly interested in new models and other valuable items such as cash, airpods and expensive coats. Reducing robbery is our top priority and our officers are working hard to catch those responsible, with activity to prevent it taking place daily.

There are however, a number of things you can do to help reduce your child's risk of becoming a victim and keep safe whilst using their phone. **If you can, talk to them about where and how they use their phone using the following advice:**

Safety when out and about:

- Keep your phone and valuables out of sight in a safe place when travelling to and from school. Be careful when you take your phone out in public places.
- Bus stops, train stations and surrounding areas are common target areas for thieves, who can approach on foot, moped or on a pedal bike or e-scooter.
- Earphones/headphones can distract you, stopping you from seeing or hearing someone approach you from behind.
- Don't confront a thief – it's not worth risking your own safety for possessions that can be replaced.
- Robbery or attempted robbery are serious crimes and should be reported. It's important you *seek help straight away by dialing 999* rather than contacting police when you get home or at school the following day. Use a friend's phone or the phone of a trusted adult. This gives us the best chance to catch the suspects, recover any stolen property and ensure your safety.

If you have information about a robbery and do not want to report it to police, speak to Fearless 100 % anonymously at www.fearless.org. Fearless is the youth service of independent charity Crimestoppers.

Whether you have a phone or not, memorise or keep a parent/carer's phone number in a separate place in your bag/zipped pocket in case of emergency.

Help protect your child's phone if it's stolen:

- Use your device's security features, apps or PIN locking mechanisms to protect your data and prevent the phone being used.
- Keep a record of the phone's IMEI number (not on your phone!). This is a 15-digit unique number which can be obtained by keying in *#06#. You need this information if the phone is lost or stolen.
- Consider installing a tracker app, available online.
